
Lowrie Button Collection to be displayed at antique club meeting

The museum has a beautiful button collection, which was assembled in 1946 by Elizabeth Lowrie, former Irvington librarian and a member of one of Irvington's pioneer families. This collection includes buttons from the early 1800s as well as some interesting local medals/medallions. On Tuesday, July 11th, Patricia Schaffarczyk will discuss the history of Elizabeth Lowrie in Irvington and display and discuss the button collection at the monthly meeting of Las Antiquelagas, a local antique club.

Save your taxes and money by donating appreciated stock to the Washington Township Museum of Local History!

You can now give appreciated stock to the WTMLH which you have held for more than one year and you may take a charitable tax deduction for the market value of the stock. Neither you nor the WTMLH have to pay capital gains taxes when the tax is sold!

- The combination can result in a bigger deduction (and more tax savings) for you and a bigger gift for the museum.
- This is a tax planning tool derived from the IRS general rule that the deduction for a donation of "property" is equal to the fair market value of the donated "property". What the stocks have gained in value, the donor does not have to recognize the gain.
- This allows you to double up on your donation to the WTMLH by a charitable deduction and avoid tax on the appreciation in value of the stock.

Controversy in New Haven – a new paper released by Tim Swenson

The New Haven Unified School District was formed in 1965 by combining the Alvarado and Decoto School Districts and James Logan High School from the Washington Union School District. The joining of the school district was fairly harmonious. The only issue in the local newspaper, the "Union City Leader", was the name of the district. The "Union City Leader" was advocating for the Union City Unified School District and was disappointed about the name "New Haven." Two years after the founding of the school district, a huge controversy erupted in the district, leading to large public attendance at meetings, calls of illegal activities and a resolution by having a recall election. This paper documents the controversy in a chronological style.

Memorial Plaque at Washington High

Les met with the principal of the school and the superintendent of the district in early May with hopes of furthering his goal. We will keep you posted on this project as we hear more.

News from the Rancho

The Rancho Higuera Caretakers Group has been busy these last few months with upkeep and planning for future events and ideas.

The group has been working closely with the city to formulate a plan for weed abatement. This has included meetings with city staff members as well as the city fire chief.

Additionally, a draft master plan has been authored to provide a sort of framework for the future of the park.



Ongoing park maintenance activites include the cutting up and removal of a dead oak tree, continued weed abatement, removal of a barbed wire fence around the adobe (soon to be replaced with a less dangerous option), removal of invasive wisteria roots, and the painting of plywood that is covering an area on the adobe that needs patching.

In April, the Ohlone Puente group cleaned the adobe windows and assisted in moving stones to form a wall along the creekside, outdoor classroom, which includes an Ohlone grinding stone to facilitate teaching. Dead tree roots were removed in the area of the fig tree and piled onto the large dead branch pile. Later, Dianne hosted Family Day on the Rancho for the third year in a row.

A fundraising seminar was attended by Jon Miller, member of the group. He hopes to produce some revenue generating ideas for the park in the near future.

A park passerby stopped by on Sunday, April 30th with a drone in his backpack. He offered to image the park for us and later sent us pictures.

Finally, the group reached out to our local Home Depot store to obtain some tools and materials to support ongoing maintenance and educational activities at the adobe. Home Depot generously donated hand tools which will be employed to cutting weed & brush within the park, a new water hose, and materials to support Dianne's classroom activities.

Big thanks to the Rancho Higuera Caretakers Group and city staff who work to keep this park going!
